### **Calendar Description:**

An introductory archaeology course that provides an overview of New and Old World prehistory; spans the earliest origins of humans, the spread of anatomically modern humans and the development of hunting and gathering societies, the origins of food production, and the emergence of ancient urban societies.

## **Course Description:**

(Lecture)

This course provides a survey of world prehistory in various major regions throughout the scope of human history. The major part of the course will review archaeological data and interpretations of the Old Stone Age (Paleolithic period), the origins and establishment of food production (Neolithic period), and the emergence of complex and state societies. These events will first be considered in the Old World and then in the New World.

### **Required Text:**

Brian M. Fagan, *People of the Earth: An Introduction to World Prehistory.* 10<sup>th</sup> edition, Upper Saddle River, New Jersey. 2001.

Supplementary readings will be handed out from time to time. Videos and slide show will also be shown on occasion to illustrate topic material. This is required material for exams.

### **Grade Determination:**

Grades for the course will be based on two non-cumulative mid-term exams (multiple choice and short answer), one assignment (short answer and short essay questions), and one non-cumulative final exam (multiple choice and short answer). The mid-terms will be valued at 25% each, the short assignment at 20%, and the final exam at 30%. They are marked using the alpha system.
