CALENDAR DESCRIPTION:

A studio-based course with emphasis on the understanding of v design dynamics of visual form. A basic course where you will be introduced to various concepts and projects using a variety of art media. The second part of the course will build upon the knowledge of Part I and colour theory. **Please note: This course is the second half of a full year course.**

GRADING CRITERIA:

Assignments:	(50%)	Specific assignments are weighted.
Process:	(20%)	Process grades includes any day to day activities, these marks are weight to an appropriate amount If you are absent, there is no opportunity to make up a missed process grade. This portion weight may be adjusted up or down based on the number of activities.
Quiz(zes):	5%.	Based on class presentations, handouts and activities.
Weekly Explorations:	12%.	This is an ongoing aesthetic assignment , 12 parts.
Visiting Artist:	3%.	Attending 'The Visitor in the Arts Lectures. You will be required to sign an attendance sheet.

Attendance: 10% A straightforward mathematical formula based on attendance, which to a degree reflects participation and engagement.

Attendance is mandatory. (Department Guidelines)

More than 20% absenteeism may constitute a failure except for medical or extenuating circumstances in which case a doctor's letter may be required. Students will receive a warning 'Notice Of Absenteeism' at 15% absenteeism.

After 20% absenteeism, you may be required to withdraw from the course.

You are required to sign the attendance sheet immediately upon your arrival.

If you are late there will be a highlight through your name, enter your late arrival time. Failure to so will result in a <u>No Late Time</u> indicated and your attendance mark for the day will default to .25

If you leave class early for any reason, you must sign out with your departure time. Early departure times will be regarded the same as a late arrival.

As an example, there are 27 classes in this course, 27/27 = 100% - A+Miss 6 classes, 18/27 = 66.67% - CMay constitute a failure, requested withdrawal. Miss 8 classes, 15/27 = 55.56% - D+This is one full month of classes.

EVALUATIONS:

No examines, assignment and process grading is on going, as per assignment due dates. Portfolios may be required mid and end term.

Mid-term number based upon assignments completed to date. Mid-term is an **indicator grade only for the student's reference** on his/her performance in the course. The weight between *In Class Process and Project Assignments* will reflect the portion of the class time spent in those areas of study.

In Class Process activities reflects the activity in class that day and they will be short. Hence they will be due at the end of the specific class for marking. **You cannot make up a process activity due to an absence. There will be no extensions for any reason.**

Failure to finish projects on time for class critiques will affect student's final evaluation. Students will be expected to invest a minimum of four hours a week in the class.

Learning Outcomes of AR 1370:

- To broaden the students understanding and working knowledge of the elements and principles of visual language. Basic elements of design: form, line, shape, value, texture, colour, space and the principles of organization: rhythm, balance, scale/proportion and movement.
- 2. An emphasis on the exploration and the thinking skills required in the production of concepts and composition.
- 3. The student will continue to explore seeing/identifying, imagining and problem solving with emphasis on an individual and collective creative approaches, thus, contributing to their understanding and appreciation of the relationship between art and other disciplines
- 4. Thoroughly study and analyze colour theory while starting to critique and understand the basics of painting as a process in both abstract and pictorial space.
- 5. Demonstrate self-disciple required to make art in a professional manner.
- 6. Further build and construct in both two and three-dimensional design.

Course Objectives of AR1370. Students will:

- 1. Learn to perceive, identify and apply the basics of elements of art, principles of design and the creative process. They will begin to communicate visually expressed information while understanding abstract and pictorial relationships.
- 2. Continue to equip themselves with a visual and verbal vocabulary.
- 3. Continue to develop and broaden critical and aesthetic criteria.

- 4. Broaden their awareness, understanding and aesthetic appreciation of art.
- 5. Further, identify their own values in relationship to their environment.
- 6. Develop basic skill and techniques.

STUDENT RESPONSIBILITIES:

• Bring the required supplies for every class. If you have missed a previous class it is your responsibility to ask your fellow students or the instructor before the start of class to insure that you have the appropriate supplies and materials ready.

• **Be punctual!** If you arrive late you will have to ask your classmates for the information. You are fully responsible for the material covered in class, projects and due dates. I will not be delivering one to one classes or lectures.
