CALENDAR DESCRIPTION: An introductory level studio course designed to give you a foundation in drawing primarily through the use of monochromatic media. Emphasis will be placed on the principles and techniques of drawing while simultaneously exploring expressive uses of the medium. You may work from the still life figure and landscape situations, as well as experiment with a broad range of drawing media.

DELIVERY MODE(S): Lecture/Lab

COURSE OBECTIVES:

During this course, the student will:

- 1. Record visual relationships in the environment and record these perceptions in terms of the elements of art (line, shape, value and texture)
- 2. Identify and apply the principles of aesthetic unity (balance, rhythm, repetition, dominance and contrast/variety) to the organization of the elements of visual art .
- 3. Manipulate the elements of visual art on a two-dimensional surface through using the principles of depth perception.
- 4. Have introduction to fundamental techniques and materials of drawing including the use of pencil, ink, conte and charcoal.
- 5. Possess introductory knowledge related to drawing the figure in monochromatic media.

LEARNING OUTCOMES:

By the end of this course, students will:

- 1. Possess a basic working knowledge of the fundamental techniques and materials of drawing materials: pencil, ink, brush, ink wash, conte and charcoal.
- 2. Develop the basic skills to render and record the natural world.
- 3. Have introduction to basics of composition as related to drawing.

During the course of the semester there will be homework assignments so students can expect to have to commit additional time to the course. Late assignments will lose 10 % for each day they are late!
