PREREQUISITE(S)/COREQUISITE: AR1370 and AR2430

REQUIRED TEXT/RESOURCE MATERIALS:

- No textbook is required.
- The auxiliary fee for this course will cover some of the materials needed (clay, glazes, molding supplies and plaster, woodshop incidentals such as screws, glue, sandpaper, etc).
- Materials for other projects will need to be purchased as we go. Depending on the scale and nature of your projects, the cost can range from \$125-250 per term.

CALENDAR DESCRIPTION: This is a studio course for the student who is familiar with the basic element of and principles of three-dimensional design. This is a two-term course offered over fall/winter terms. It is identifiable in the Schedule of Courses (Timetable) with a Part A and a Part B. Students must register in both the Part A and the Part B of all types of sections offered (sections, labs, seminars, etc.) for this course.

CREDIT/CONTACT HOURS: 6 (3-0-3) UT, 30 weeks, 180 hours

DELIVERY MODE(S):

Lecture/lab.

OBJECTIVES (OPTIONAL):

During this course the student will:

- 1. Identify and apply the basic principles of art and design as they relate to three-dimensional objects, including balance, movement, repetition, and scale.
- 2. Learn about the characteristics of various sculptural media (including wood, clay, plaster, and found materials) and develop the technical skills required to manipulate them.
- 3. Exhibit a basic working knowledge of sculptural methods including modeling, molding and casting, construction and assemblage.
- 4. Learn about expanded notions of sculpture (including performance art, living sculpture and site-specific art) and experiment with these modes of production.
- 5. Be encouraged to think creatively, to problem solve and to experiment.
- 6. Develop a critical understanding of sculpture through class discussions and critiques.
- 7. Demonstrate the ability to independently research artists, techniques or media related to the field of sculpture and present a portion of this research to the class.
- 8. Learn how to write a proposal document to present a work in a particular site.

EVALUATIONS:

- Attendance and participation: 10%
- Sculpture projects: 70% (three to four sculpture projects per term). Overdue assignments will be penalised 10% per day. Assignments will be evaluated against the stated objectives of each project, in addition to the level of creativity and craftsmanship demonstrated.
- Presentation about an artist or technique related to sculpture: 20% (one per term).
