CALENDAR DESCRIPTION: This is a studio course for the student who is familiar with the basic element of and principles of three-dimensional design. This is a two-term course offered over fall/winter terms. It is identifiable in the Schedule of Courses (Timetable) with a Part A and a Part B. Students must register in both the Part A and the Part B of all types of sections offered (sections, labs, seminars, etc.) for this course.

PREREQUISITE(S)/COREQUISITE: AR1370 and AR2430 or consent of the department with portfolio

REQUIRED TEXT/RESOURCE MATERIALS:

— No textbook is required

The auxiliary fee for this course will cover some of the materials needed (clay, glazes, molding supplies and plaster, woodshop incidentals such as screws, glue, sandpaper, etc.)

Materials for individualized projects will need to be purchased as the course proceeds. Depending on the scale and nature of your projects, the cost can range from \$200-\$350 for the year.

DELIVERY MODE(S): Lecture and Lab

COURSE OBJECTIVES:

1. Identify and apply the basic principles of art and design as they relate to three-dimensional objects, including balance, emphasis, movement, repetition, and scale.

2. Learn about the characteristics of various sculptural media (including wood, clay, plaster, and found materials) and develop the technical skills required to manipulate them.

3. Exhibit a basic working knowledge of sculptural methods: modeling, molding and casting, construction and assemblage.

4. Be encouraged to experiment, to think critically and creatively, and to problem solve.

5. Develop a critical understanding of sculpture through verbal discussion and critiques.

6. Learn about expanded notions of sculpture including performance art, living sculpture and sitespecific art.

7. Demonstrate the ability to independently research artists, techniques or media related to the field of sculpture.

LEARNING OUTCOMES:

1. To broaden the students understanding and working knowledge of the elements and principles of visual language. Basic elements of 3D design: form, shape, texture, space, balance and gravity using the principles of organization: rhythm, balance, scale/proportion and movement / alignment.

2. An emphasis on the exploration and the thinking skills required in the production of a sculptural expression.

3. The student will begin to explore seeing/identifying, imagining and problem solving with emphasis on an individual and or collective creative approaches, thus, contributing to their understanding and appreciation of the relationship between sculpture and other disciplines.

4. Demonstrate self-discipline required to make art in a professional manner.

5. To build construct and model in three-dimensional design.

EVALUATIONS:

No examinations, assignment and process grading is ongoing and as per assignment due dates. Portfolios may be required mid and end term.

Mid-term indicator grade is based upon assignments completed to date. Mid-term is an **indicator** grade only for the student's reference on his/her performance in the course. You will be informed if you are in jeopardy.

The Lab mark reflects the in-class-activities of that day. They will tend to be short and act as a preparation for an assignment. Hence they will be due at the end of the specific class for marking. (There will be no extensions for any reason)

Failure to finish projects on time for class critiques will affect student's final evaluation. Students will be expected to invest a minimum of four hours a week in the class.

Attendance is mandatory. (Department Guidelines)

More than 20% absenteeism (6 classes = 19.23 %) may constitute a failure except for medical or extenuating circumstances in which case a doctor's letter may be required. Students will receive a warning 'Notice Of Absenteeism' at 15%.

Excessive Lateness:

You have 5 minutes of late grace time for each class. Excess late times above the grace period will be accumulated and converted into equivalent classes. As an example:

COURSE SCHEDULE/TENTATIVE TIMELINE:

Studio based activities in addition to homework assignments to be determined by the instructor. Fieldwork may require visits to sites off campus, including museums and galleries. Students will be expected to invest a minimum of **six hours per week** outside of class time.

Content over view

First Term

1. Introduction to Sculptural Practices

For 8 to 10 classes, (up to the fall break) we will be exploring a number of materials and processes. These *media tests* will be a mixture of Lab activities and small assignments. They will be big enough, allowing you to be engaged in the work but not so large as to be onerous. They will introduce you to a basic but wide enough range of sculptural potentials, hopefully giving you a comfort zone when addressing larger assignments.

These *media tests* will include:

- a. Introduction to wood working tools, shop processes.
- b. Note taking and quizzes will be extensive in this portion of the course.
- c. Foraging for materials for constructions and mixed media
- d. Assemblage / construction, linear and planar structures
- e. Intervention of scale in sculpture
- f. Stone and stick constructions
- g. Clay relief, silicon mold making and casting in various materials
- h. Clay Tiles for surface tests
- i. Clay modeling, textures, dichotomies / contrasts
- j. Surface finishing using different media on clay, plaster and cement.

2. Larger Assignments

a. Studies in mixed media and wood

Second Term

- b. Studies in clay, iconic forms and attitudes of presentation
- c. Studies in clay, facial segment studies and self-portraiture The relationship between object and plinth
- More casting in plaster, clay, maybe cement or wax (other materials) Mixed media relief with clay with more complex mold making Continued explorations of finishing

3. Open Projects Time Pending

e. Self-initiated assignments and any media and codirected through a one-one mentorship approach.

4. Drawing

As a way to lead you in and out of sculptural considerations, relationships and explorations using the drawn surface as an investigative tool. Any drawing or collages will be LAB marks.
