CALENDAR DESCRIPTION: This course will help students become more sophisticated users and producers of written texts. Instruction will include basic academic essay writing skills and the various rhetorical approaches used when addressing specific audiences. The main goals of the course are to help students integrate reading and writing and to become familiar with the conventions of college- (and university-) level writing. This includes producing coherent, logical texts that are relatively free of surface errors. To achieve these goals, the course encourages students to think critically, to read closely and analytically, and to compose responses to a variety of texts, both written and visual.

PREREQUISITE(S)/COREQUISITE: English 30-1

REQUIRED TEXT/RESOURCE MATERIALS:

Required: *Essay Essentials with Readings*, ed. by Rhonda Dynes and others (Nelson, 2018). Recommended: *Canadian Writer's Handbook* (Oxford, 2022).

All the other readings will be posted on myClass (D2L). Please be sure to log in regularly and check for updates and announcements. It is your responsibility to make sure you can access each reading well before we discuss it in class.

DELIVERY MODE(S): The class takes place on the Grande Prairie Campus in room E302. Course work includes lectures, class discussion, group work, in-class quizzes, and individual assignments both written and oral.

LEARNING OUTCOMES: A student who is successful in this class should be able to:

- Read literary and non-literary texts with critical attentiveness and care
- Recognize multiple forms of sentence construction and sentence-types that answer to different rhetorical purposes
- Craft sentences that communicate nuanced ideas clearly
- See the essay as a genre of writing with a history and a literary form in its own right
- Outline, proofread, and revise effectively, not only to rid a rough draft of surface errors but to adjust its tone, style, and content to fit specific purposes and audiences
- Describe the constituent parts of a soundly-constructed essay
- Compose a thoughtful response to a prompt or to another piece of writing
