English 2060: The Short Story

COURSE

DESCRIPTION:

This course will introduce the student to the genre of the short story by examining the structural qualities of a number of representative short stories. Some attention will be paid to critical essays discussing the Short Story milieu, but the focus of attention will be on critical analysis of both early and modern stories by the recognized masters in the field.

PREREQUISITE:

EN 1010 or an equivalent course.

COURSE

OBJECTIVES:

 A. Gaining a broader understanding and appreciation of an intellectual-cultural activity 

— namely, the close study of the Short Story.

Developing skill in expressing oneself orally an in writing.

COURSE

REQUIREMENTS: A. Two essays - 25% each.

B. A one-hour mid-term examination - 10%.
 C. A three-hour final examination - 30%

D. Class participation via directed group work - 10%

The essays and class work shall constitute 60% of the course grade, the mid-term 10%, and the final examination the remaining 30%.

INSTRUCTION:

Lectures and group discussions.

- (d) Correctness in grammar, punctuation, and spelling.
