This course is a continuation of French 0120A with greater emphasis on the reading and writing skills. We will also continue to develop aural / oral skills, and will attempt to speak more French in class. When taken with French 0120, this course is the equivalent of French 0100, which was formerly offering at GPRC and is still being offered at the U of A.

Prerequisite

Alberta High School French 20 or equivalent (i.e. successful completion of French 0120/0120A.

You will be expected to acquire a copy of both the textbook and the exercise book by the second class, as these represent the principal material for the course. You will also need at least one blank cassette tape for lab exercises and exams.

In French 0130A, we will cover the second half of the <u>Contacts</u> text and workbook, starting from where we left off in French 0120A. You are asked to spend as much time as necessary working with the practice tapes, in order to master the material learned in each lesson.

Attendance

As new language structures will be introduced daily, class attendance is deemed essential. A pattern of missing classes will eventually manifest itself in poor performance and failing grades. Class participation is strongly encouraged!!! A student who has missed a total of ten classes in any semester without demonstrating just cause fro the absences, and whose average for the term is below fifty percent, may, at the discretion of the instructor, be barred from writing the final exam.

Activities

Mondays will be lab days (Tuesday following Labour Day and Thanksgiving). Please remember to bring your blank cassette and your workbook. You will then hand in your workbook on the following day. All exams will be on Fridays, except for the orals and the midterm aural exam (see below). Besides the text, you will be working with worksheets, short readings, poems and songs.

Exams and Assignments

There will be <u>six quizzes</u>, each worth six percent. At the end of the semester, the lowest mark attained will be dropped. Thus, the remaining five will provide thirty percent of the final grade.

There will also be a <u>midterm</u>, valued at twenty-five percent, and a <u>final</u> also worth twenty-five percent. All exams include a written and an aural component. The midterm and final exams have an oral component also. The remainder of your grade will be as follows:

one oral report, to be delivered at a pre-chosen time during the last week of the term, worth five percent.

one essay, due on or before the last day of class, worth five percent.

ten weekly lab assignments, each worth one percent.

Although no grade has been assigned for class participation, a discretionary five percent extra can be obtained by those whose input adds to the quality of the course. In other words, browny points are available!
