COURSE DESCRIPTION

Rudiments of Music is designed to provide students with a basic understanding of music theory. The fundamentals of music theory will be approached through aural and written training. No previous knowledge of music is required. MU 1000 is the prerequisite course to many of the University Transfer courses offered in the Music Section of the Fine Arts Department.

COURSE OBJECTIVES

As a result of instruction, personal study and reflection it is expected that all students who complete the course will be able to:

- 1) Identify the properties of individual sounds.
- 2) Notate and read music sounds.
- 3) Define basic musical symbols and terms.
- 4) Design and identify major minor and whole tone scales, as well as intervals & triads.
- 5) Identify (written and aural) and compose musical compositions in simple, triple, and quadruple meters.
- 6) Create a variety of musical compositions using the basic structural elements of musical composition.
- 7) Compare, create, and analyse melodic material as found in musical compositions.
- 8) Evaluate, identify, and compose with the basic elements of harmonic design.
