CALENDAR DESCRIPTION: This is a study of Common Practice harmony, including elementary analysis with discussion of elements of formal contrapuntal writing, chord progressions, and chorale textures.

PREREQUISITE(S)/COREQUISITE: MU1000 or successful completion of a Music Theory Placement Exam, or Royal Conservatory Level 8 Theory, or Conservatory Canada Gr. 4 Theory Exam.

COURSE OBJECTIVES: This course will briefly review materials that you already know. Students will solidify their understanding of notation, meter, scales, modes, intervals, and chords. Counterpoint will be introduced, leading to the main discussion of writing and analyzing diatonic harmony in four parts. Students will become familiar with chord motions, cadences, and non-harmonic devices.

LEARNING OUTCOMES: Upon successful completion of this course, students will be able to work with scales and modes, write basic counterpoint, and demonstrate basic competency in writing and analysing diatonic harmony, including figured bass, cadences, non-harmonic devices, and voice leading.
