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Course Description:

This is a continuation of course material covered in MU1550. Course content includes an introduction to formal analysis of two-part and three-part structures. Considerable emphasis will be placed on learning how to resolve and apply dominant seventh, non dominant seventh, leading-tone seventh, and secondary dominant and leading-tone chords to four-part harmonic settings. Students will also discover how to analyze and write harmonic modulations to various closely-related key centers.

Prerequisite:

Successful completion of MU1550 Music Theory I.

Corequisite:

MU1510 Aural and Keyboard Skills I.

The Course in Perspective:

Students will continue to gain a practical knowledge of diatonic harmony, formal analysis and compositional techniques. As the highest percentage of learning occurs through the application of knowledge students will be asked to complete several assignments throughout the term. This course will be covering roughly chapters 10 to 17 of the text. Students may be asked to use aspects of aural skills such as singing, solfegging, or intoning of rhythms to reinforce certain theoretical concepts that are being examined throughout the course. Students in this course will also spend some time discussing how most of the material covered in this course is used by composers of "popular" music. Please note: Course content and assignments may be used in this course that are not a part of the textbook or workbook.

Assignments:

Students will have regular reading and written assignments from the class, text, and workbook. It is very important that homework assignments be finished on time. Much of each class discussion will be based on concepts and material learned from completing homework assignments. Class assignments that are handed in will be marked and each mark will be calculated towards your final grade
