CALENDAR DESCRIPTION: Introductory Cree II is a continuation of a general introduction to Plains Cree (Y dialect) grammar, and vocabulary with an emphasis in the practice in speaking and writing in Cree Syllabics and Roman Orthography. Some knowledge of Cree is necessary. This course may be delivered remotely from time to time; therefore, students are required to have access to internet and a laptop or computer. COURSE OBECTIVES: Students will be able to comprehend simple sentences written in Roman Orthography, through their knowledge of vocabulary, word agreement, word order and association. Students will also be able to interpret and write in Cree Syllabics. Individual projects will be done both in written and presented orally in class. There will be in class and some take home assignments throughout this term. Often the structure is provided for you through class lectures. Attendance and participation are very important in this course. Students will not be allowed to reschedule missed quizzes or assignments unless they provide a valid reason. This course will provide preparation for the intermediate Cree NS153.

LEARNING OUTCOMES: As a result of taking this course, students will gain the abilities to:

- demonstrate and understand simple sentences written in Roman Orthography, and Cree Syllabics through their knowledge gained of the vocabulary, word agreement word order and association.
- recognize words written in Roman Orthography.
- identify and incorporate Cree words into simple sentences by translating them into English.
- demonstrate basic level understanding of the Cree language
- apply and evaluate their knowledge of basic terms written and spoken in Cree.

Important Note on Assignments: Deadlines for assignments will be strictly observed. All assignments are due at the beginning of class on the date they are due. LATE assignments are penalized 5% PER DAY that they are late to a maximum of five days (25%); after five days, late assignments will not be accepted. Only in extremely special cases will extensions be granted. The instructor will not be responsible for any assignment handed in to anyone other than the instructor. It is expected that all assignments will be typed (except for in-class exams). Assignments are not handed back until all assignments are in. The final paper will be handed back at the last class or at the final exam. Student assignments remaining with the instructor 90 days after the semester ends will be shredded.

Projects:

Students will complete three projects:

Assignment 1 (10%) Lesson Plan on Cree Culture or Language:

Students will be required to submit a lesson plan following the Alberta Cree Curriculum. Lesson plan must identify Grade, General and Specific Outcomes (as per curriculum), learning objectives, materials that will be needed for lesson and evaluation methods must be identified or attached, also please explain how students will retain lesson learned. Should be a one-page lesson plan, along with any attachments required to teach the lesson.

Assignment 2 (10%) Research Paper:

Students will write a research paper on a topic related to Cree Culture or Language. Essay must be between 6 to 8 pages in length, not including title or reference pages. Must reference using a credited reference style, ie, APA, MLA, Chigaco, etc... A minimum of 5 references will be used and they must be 3

different sources, ie, magazine, book, journal, article, online source, etc... There must be a minimum of ten sentences written in Cree (Roman Orthography) along with translations in English.

Assignment 3 (10%) Oral Presentation on Lesson Plan:

Students will create a presentation on the lesson plan submitted earlier. Online sources must be used and students will be graded on originality, creativity and methods used to teach the lesson. Students become the teachers and are expected to teach the lesson plan presented in a realistic manner. Try not to over teach topic. Stick to the level you are teaching and is the lesson doable? Lesson must contain language or culture as per the Alberta Cree Curriculum.

Students will be given 20 mins from start to finish for presentation. This time will include introduction and time for evaluations at the end. Students will be graded on time management as well as content.

Participation (10%):

Attendance will be taken for each class and students will be expected to complete work assignments assigned on D2L for full participation mark.

Language Laboratory: Language lab tapes are available for student use. Attendance is critical and is included as a portion of your lab grade.

Guest Speakers: Upon availability and time permitting.

Quizzes: Attendance is imperative as quizzes are given a high percentage in final grading of the course.

- a) 3 take-home assignments per term
- b) 2 in-class guizzes plus midterm and final exam per term
- 3) Field trip

Attendance: Attendance is recorded daily. A medical note from a Medical Physician is required when absent from exams.
