CALENDAR DESCRIPTION:

This course examines human sexuality from biopsychological, developmental, behavioural, and psychosocial perspectives. Students will learn about healthy and unhealthy sexuality and its potential psychological consequences on individuals and society.

OBJECTIVES:

As a result of taking this course, students will gain the abilities to define, explain, demonstrate, evaluate and articulate:

- The evolution of sex and sexuality over the centuries and how various cultures view sex and sexuality.
- The theories that explain sexuality the relative contributions of nature and nurture.
- The biological structures which are involved, and not so involved, in sexual behaviour and reproduction.
- The sexual response cycle and the various modifications that have been proposed.
- The difference between healthy and unhealthy sexuality and its impact on individuals and society.
- The development of sexuality and the relationship between sex and such aspects as love, attraction, desire, fantasy.
- The risk of associated with sexual behaviours and its consequences to the individual, family, and ultimately society.

- Sexually transmitted diseases and their short and long term cost.
- The difference between sexual dysfunctions and sexual disorders and the various treatment modalities currently in use to treat these problems.
