CALENDAR DESCRIPTION: This is an introductory survey of representative theoretical points of view and research relevant to the major problems of the study of personality.

COURSE OBJECTIVES: This course introduces students to:

- the major theories, perspectives and concepts in the field of personality
- the various research methods used in personality research
- the roles of biology, environment, the self, and consciousness in each theory of personality
- the psychological manifestations predicted by each theory of personality

LEARNING OUTCOMES: As a result of taking this course, students will gain the abilities to:

- articulate fundamental knowledge and comprehension of major concepts in each personality theory
- discuss and explain how the principles of theses personality theories explain the everyday personality characteristics and traits we see in ourselves and others
- identify and incorporate the elements of each personality theory to explain psychological attributes
- apply and evaluate knowledge of the basic elements of each theory to predict future behaviours
- demonstrate a basic level understanding of various research methods used in scientific investigations of personality research and critically evaluate these methods

Paper: This is a reflective paper. You must keep a daily journal of the concepts and activities that were presented and discussed in class. You must relate these activities and concepts to yourself or someone in your environment. In your writing, try to analyze behaviours, thoughts, and emotions in the context of the theory that was covered. In other words, how would Freud, Jung, Erikson, Roger, etc. view and analyze the person about whom you are writing. Basically, it is an application of the various personality theories and perspectives to yourself or the person of interest.
