CALENDAR DESCRIPTION

This is an overview of research, practice, and policy issues in Forensic Psychology. Both criminal and civil forensic topics will be discussed, including the history of forensic psychology, ethical issues in forensic practice, police selection processes, theories of criminal behaviour, criminal profiling, jury selection, validity of eyewitness reports, abuse against women and children, child custody, and insanity/competency.

COURSE OBJECTIVES:

Students will be taught how research in Forensic Psychology has been applied to practice within criminal and civil legal systems. Topics covered will include:

- The history of forensic psychology
- The Canadian legal system
- Forensic Assessment in Criminal and Civil Domains
- Forensic Treatment
- Children and the Law (e.g., child witnesses)
- Juveniles and the Law (e.g., accountability)
- Eyewitness Testimony
- Police Investigations—interrogations and confessions
- Police Psychology-training, criminal profiling
- Juries
- Risk Assessment/Risk Management
- Offenders

LEARNING OUTCOMES:

As a result of taking this course, students will be able to

- demonstrate fundamental knowledge and comprehension of major concepts, theoretical perspectives and empirical findings in the areas of forensic psychology
- demonstrate understanding of forensic assessment in criminal and civil domains, including issues pertaining to determination of fitness to stand trial, determination of criminal responsibility, determination of risk for recidivism, assessment for the purpose of civil commitment, assessment for the purpose of determining parental capacity, and assessing risk for child maltreatment
- demonstrate understanding of how offenders with mental illness receive treatment and the impact of treatment on recidivism
- demonstrate understanding of how children who are witnesses for criminal and civil cases are assessed for competence to provide testimonies and the nature of testimonial supports available to child witnesses
- demonstrate understanding of the rights of young offenders and how these rights have evolved over that last century
- demonstrate understanding of how eyewitness memory/accounts are affected by the nature of the event to be remembered, interview techniques, etc.
- demonstrate understanding of the nature of interrogation and how interrogation techniques affect confessions
- demonstrate understanding of how criminal profiles are constructed and used to solve crimes
- demonstrate understanding of how juries make decisions pertaining to guilt and issues that affect decision making
- demonstrate knowledge of various types/subtypes of offenders
- demonstrate basic level understanding of various research methods used in scientific investigations of psychological phenomena
- apply their knowledge of basic research methodology to critically evaluate psychological research

- **1. Quizzes:** There will be four multiple choice quizzes based on material covered in both the textbook and the lectures. Each quiz is worth 5%, for a course total of 20%. They are closed-book exams, meaning that for the duration of the quizzes, students are not allowed to access the course materials (whether they are on paper or on computers/other devices).
- <u>2. Midterm and Final Exams</u>: The midterm and final exams will include multiple-choice questions and short answer questions based on material covered in both the textbook and the lectures. The midterm is worth 20% and the final exam is worth 30%. THE FINAL EXAM WILL NOT BE CUMULATIVE.

Note on Quizzes, Midterm and Final Exams:

- During exams, you are not allowed to access course materials (i.e., no access to notes/book, whether in paper format or on devices). Accessing such materials will be considered cheating and will result in an automatic "0" on the exam.
- Activities such as holidays or employment are not considered excusable reasons for missing any exam. Students who chose to miss an exam for employment, holiday, or other unexcused reasons may receive a "0" on the exam.
- The dates of the quizzes and midterm are posted on page 5. The final exam date is to be determined by Student Services (note that the final exam period is from April December 14 to 24, inclusive). Please refer to pages 6 and 7 of this course outline for information on missed quizzes.
- 3. <u>Participation/Attendance</u>: Student input during lectures is enthusiastically welcomed and strongly encouraged. Attendance will be taken every class. Attendance may be taken more than once during a class period. Please note that in my courses, students who miss more than 10% of classes without an acceptable excuse may be debarred from writing the final exam.
- <u>4.</u> Chapter Assignments: There will be 15 multiple-choice chapter assignments, each comprised of questions taken from the textbook material. These are open-book assignments to be completed out of class. Your marks across all the assignments will be averaged; the average mark of all the assignments is worth 10% of your overall grade. You will answer the questions of each assignment by clicking the relevant link. These links are found under the "Chapter Assignments" widget or by clicking "Quizzes" on the blue banner at the top of the myClass page.

Deadlines for each assignment are noted in 3 ways:

- this course outline (page 5)
- the PDF Chapter Assignment booklet posted on myClass
- on the assignment links found on myClass.

Please write these deadlines on your calendar and setup myClass to send you reminders of upcoming deadlines. The links will close at 11:59 (1 minute before midnight) on the dates listed (on page 5) and will not be reopened past the deadline. It is your responsibility to know the deadline of each assignment.

Do not ask for an extension if you miss a deadline.

NOTE: The assignments are generally <u>due before I cover the material in class</u> as they are designed to <u>help</u> <u>prepare you</u> for the lectures. Also, note that myClass refers to these assignments as "Quizzes"; the assignments are also accessible

2. **RESPECTFUL BEHAVIOR**

Students are expected to exhibit respectful behavior to the instructor, guest speakers and other students. We will discuss topics in class that may cause disagreement. It is expected that all participants will deal with such disagreements WITHOUT resorting to behaviors/comments that are dismissive, demeaning or threatening to others. Swearing and use of slurs against individuals or groups (racial, religious, gender, etc.) are unacceptable. Students unable to meet these expectations will be required to leave the class in the interest of preserving the learning opportunities of other students. 3. ATTEND CLASS AT THE SCHEDULED CLASS TIMES:

Students are expected to attend lectures at the scheduled class times. Attendance will be taken every class and may be taken more than once each class

- Missed Lecture Material: Although notes are available on myClass, they are not complete; attendance is required to get full lecture information. If you miss a class, you are to obtain missed material by approaching a classmate, <u>not</u> the instructor. It would be <u>unfair</u> for students who miss lectures to be advantaged by getting the instructor's notes.
- Missed Quizzes/Exams: Dates for the quizzes and midterm are included on page 5 of this course outline. Missed quizzes will generally not be rescheduled. If you miss a quiz due to verified illness, dentistry, accident, emergency, or NWP obligations (e.g., you are away due to the requirements of another course, athletics) the weight of the quiz will be transferred; the weight of Quiz 1 or 2 will be transferred to the midterm exam, the weight of Quiz 3 or 4 will be transferred to the final exam. Quizzes missed for reasons that do not include verified illness, dentistry, accident, or emergency, will be assigned a "0" (zero). Holidays, employment, etc. are NOT considered to be excusable reasons to miss any exam in this course. Furthermore, quizzes missed without explanation from the student will be assigned a "0".

According to NWP policy, deferring a missed Midterm Exam is at the discretion of the instructor. In my courses, students who miss a midterm because of illness, dentistry, accident, or emergency (verified) may write the midterm at a later date (set by me—I will choose a date that is mutually convenient for me and the student). When students miss the midterm for reasons that do not include verified illness, dentistry, accident, or emergency, a "0" is assigned to that midterm. Students who miss the midterm without explanation will receive a "0" on the midterm. Absences from a registrar scheduled Final Exam fall under NWP Examination Policy. It is the responsibility of the student to be informed about these policies prior to the final examination period. If you miss the final exam due to illness, you will be required to submit an application to the Registrar's office for permission to write a deferred exam and must do so within 48 hours of the scheduled exam time. You may defer the final exam for up to 20 days after the end of the examination period. You will be required to provide documentation for your illness.

- <u>4.</u> LEARN & RECORD ASSIGNMENT DEADLINES AND EXAMINATION DATES/TIMES: These dates are posted on this course outline and on myClass. You can set the notifications on myClass to remind you of upcoming assignment deadlines and exams. For the sake of fairness for ALL students, assignment deadlines will NOT be extended for those who miss an assignment. If you know that you will be away when an assignment is due, it is expected that you hand in that assignment earlier than the announced/posted date. FYI—myClass chapter assignments can started/completed before the announced/posted deadlines.
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OUT-OF-CLASS WORK: Students are expected to prepare for each lecture by reading the assigned chapters and lecture notes that are posted in advance. Although all information in the textbook is important and interesting, limited class time prevents discussion of all the material covered in the assigned chapters. You are responsible for learning the material covered in the assigned chapters, including material that is not discussed in class.

6. CHECK YOUR STUDENT EMAIL/USE YOUR STUDENT EMAIL TO COMMUNICATE WITH ME.

On occasion, I will send students emails about something important, such as information about exams or assignments. If I need to cancel a class, I will inform students through email. These emails go to your student email account (i.e., nwpolytech.ca), not your personal email account. Also, you must use your student email to communicate with me. Many hotmail/gmail/telus etc. emails get sent to my junk folder rather than my inbox, so I may miss emails from such accounts (or notice them much later).
